February Activities:

Connecting with Partners: Native Women's Association of Canada

Heather Castleden and Jeff Masuda hosted Sarah Harney of the Native Women's Association of Canada - PEKE for a day of meetings (and dinner, of course!) on culturally-relevant sex- and gender based analyses for A SHARED Future in Kingston.

David Suzuki Foundation

Heather Castleden and Robert Stefanelli met with Sherry Yano of the David Suzuki Foundation about an upcoming conference, *Scientia: A Conference on the Intersection of Traditional Knowledge and Science* and the potential role A SHARED Future team members could play at it. At present, the conference has been tentatively scheduled for November 2018, and Heather and Sherry brainstormed around the possibility of A SHARED Future organizing a breakout

session on community renewable energy and Two-Eyed Seeing.

Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) Webinar

Indigenous Women in Renewable Energy

Heather Castleden and Melissa Quesnelle (a 20/20 Catalyst Alum) have begun exploring the possibility of developing a research project proposal concerning the experiences of Indigenous women involved in the renewable energy sector.

Our idea is to hold a series of Invitational Gatherings to present an opportunity for knowledge sharing (research) through storytelling between Indigenous women who are leaders/champions in renewable energy, as well as peer mentorship for those who are at various stages of their community-based renewable energy initiatives plan. Future gatherings and associated research would be emergent as a result of the women's directions arising from the first Gathering.

Programmatic Steering Committee Meeting: A Revised Governance Structure!

The Programmatic Steering Committee (PSC) met in February for our bi-monthly teleconference where we discussed a revised draft Terms of Reference for changes to our governance structure that would allow more transparency, shared responsibilities, and internal mentorship through Two-Eyed Seeing. This change includes co-Directorship for A SHARED Future; while Heather Castleden will continue to serve as Continuing Co-Director, a two-year rotating 'Pro Tem' Co-Director will also be nominated.

Dr. Debbie Martin (Dalhousie University) has agreed to step into the role of Pro-Tem Co-Director until Diana Lewis (Dalhousie) is finished her PhD later this spring/summer. Immediately after the defense, Debbie will pass this role to Diana! We couldn't be happier, and more grateful to you both for your willingness to take on additional work with A SHARED Future!

In addition to our Pro-Tem Co-Director, we have also determined the importance of having an Executive Body to make financial decisions about programmatic activities and projects. This Body will be comprised of the Pro-Tem Co-Director (Chair), the Continuing Co-Director (ex-officio), another (rotating) member of the PSC, a (rotating) PhD student affiliated with A SHARED Future, and a (rotating) Partner (ideally with renewable energy expertise). While some positions are not yet filled, we do wish to note that Mary Beth Doucette (Cape Breton University) has agreed to fill the PhD student position on the committee. Thank you Mary Beth! If you are interested in being involved in this committee, please contact Rob Stefanelli.

Project Updates from the PSC

Academic Co-Leads provided updates on their respective projects at the PSC Meeting, and a brief synopsis is provided here:

Emily Root: Has met with the co-leaders of the Collaborative Environmental Planning Initiative, along with PhD Trainee, Ms. Mary Beth Doucette, and they have started to identify potential interviewees as their project gets under way.

Diana Lewis: Conversations with project colead Tanna Pirie-Wilson (Tobique First

Nation) continue. They met on February 23, 2018 in Tobique, NB and are pleased to report that an Interim Project Advisory Committee is meeting on April 13, 2018 in Halifax to finalize a project proposal for submission to the Programmatic Steering Committee in late April.

Debbie Martin: Introduced MES student, Ms. Emily Beacock, to NunatuKavut Community Council members in Goose Bay and received feedback and approval on her Master's research. While there, she learned about economic issues and the possible solutions for challenges in coastal communities in NunatuKavut. Debbie and Amy (NCC Co-Lead) are working with their team to develop a proposal for the PSC to review. They may also be interested in recruiting an Engineering student to assist with monitoring and baseline data collection.

Jeff Masuda: Notes that A SHARED Future presents a tremendous opportunity to shape SGBA in research, and we should capitalize on this chance. Jeff and Sarah Harney (Sex and Gender co-champions) are offering their assistance in creating robust plans to address gender-based research implications.

Heather Castleden: A SHARED Future's postdoctoral fellow, Dr. Chad Walker, has been working on a media analysis concerning Indigenous representation in renewable energy over the past ten years across 6 Canadian new sources; he has also received ethics approval to conduct a study with renewable energy developers concerning their perspectives and their uptake of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Call to Action #92 (Corporate Sector). Heather's PhD student, Ms. Priscilla Apronti, is developing a proposal that will align with the critical analysis of the NRCan program. Heather's senior undergraduate student, Ms. Elissa Bozhkov has completed her data collection involving interviews with the International Institute of Sustainable Development - Experimental Lakes Area employees about reconciliation and will share her analysis in a subsequent newsletter.

Hannah Tait Neufeld: Elections took place at project site T'Sou-ke Nation, and we congratulate Chief Planes, who was reelected; we also wish him a speedy recovery from a recent health issue. Hannah, Heather, and MSc student Brianna Poirier will be travelling to T'Sou-ke in April to continue to develop a research project concerning new developments with the Nation, including the new T'Sou-ke Sustainability Centre (social enterprise) and a five-year program to assist

First Nations youth who will work in Zambia, Uganda and South Africa on sustainability issues, social justice, health, and cultural exchange.

Derek Kornelsen: Notes that a proposal and budget are nearing completion for the program analysis of the NRCan project.

Derek's appointment at the University of Manitoba officially ended on March 29th, and he will be working with A SHARED Future under his newly established sole proprietorship called Rootstalk Resources.

Chantelle Richmond: Was happy to report to the A SHARED Future team that she is back on her feet after successful back surgery, and is in the process of reconnecting with partners in Pic River. Welcome back Chantelle! Chantelle has recruited two new students that are in the process of developing their respective research proposals and are hoping to address similar research objectives as A SHARED Future. Chantelle has recruited an Indigenous trainee from Saugeen First Nation to conduct their PhD research in community resistance to nuclear energy, in addition to a MA student with an interest in Indigenous cartography and community energy projects.

Departure of one of A SHARED Future's Principal Investigators

Dr. Gregory Lowan-Trudeau, who was a Principal Investigator for the first year of the A SHARED Future program has needed to step down to focus on his other research engagements. Best wishes Greg!

March Activities:

Manuscript Submission

Renewable Energy and Energy Autonomy:
How Indigenous Peoples in Canada are
Shaping an Energy Future, is a systematic and realist review of existing energy literature on renewable energy and autonomy in Canada, and it is now complete! The manuscript, authored by members of A SHARED Future's Programmatic Steering Committee, has been submitted to the journal editors of Environmental Reviews for peer review. We are awaiting a decision on acceptance and whether there will be any revisions. We will circulate an early view of the paper once we receive the decision.

TREC Renewable Energy Report

One of A SHARED Future's organizational partners, TREC Renewable Energy Co-op, has just released a report on their latest

research, Growing Indigenous Power: A
Review of Indigenous Involvement &
Resources to Further Renewable Energy
Development Across Canada. The report
highlights the current state of Indigenousowned renewable energy across Canada, by
exploring the potential benefits such programs
can bring to communities. The Report features
examples of Indigenous power projects, and
outlines the various supportive policies and
programs that exist in each province.

International Advisory Committee Meeting

The International Advisory Committee (IAC) held its bi-annual teleconference in March. Members from Australia, New Zealand, the United States, and Canada attended the meeting, chaired by our IAC Chair, Simon Brascoupé, to discuss the current state of the A SHARED Future program, as well as to participate in a Roundtable on Two-Eyed Seeing. The IAC offered their experiences in applying a co-learning approach to engaging with Indigenous and Western knowledge systems in research. IAC members discussed conducting research with communities as a trusted ally, and negotiating community research approvals instead of university research ethics board approvals, among other topics. Full meeting minutes are available online, here.

Given the wealth of activities to report on, an interest in hearing directly from the Co-Leads of Projects to allow for more engagement and offerings of constructive feedback, as well as the rich conversation emerging from the Roundtable, we have proposed that the IAC meet four times per year, subject to member availability - we recognize that not everyone can always be available to participate. And so, beginning in 2019, we will proceed with the following format: First quarter (January): Program Update; Second quarter (April): Roundtable Topic; Third quarter (July): Program Update; Fourth Quarter (October): Roundtable Topic. Our next IAC meeting is scheduled for October 18th, 2018.


Conversations with Nunavut's Senior Administrative Officers in Igaluit

Heather Castleden and Derek Kornelsen were invited by Meaghan Bennett (NRCan) to attend – as observers – the 2018 Nunavut Senior Administrative Officers (SAOs) workshop on 'Toward Integration', where Meaghan and her team would be presenting information about their funding program. While Heather could not attend, Chad Walker was able to, representing her, along with Derek in Iqaluit.

Presentations and discussions centred around renewable energy development, governance, and opportunities for funding local projects and programs. Workshop attendees included SAOs, federal and territorial officials, energy consultants and developers of energy projects.

As the only academic researchers there, Derek and Chad were given the chance to present about A SHARED Future during the first full day of the workshop. They showed the 15 minute A SHARED Future video, discussed individual roles within the program, and responded to SAO's questions. The next day, they met with Government of Nunavut officials and later toured the Iqaluit Diesel Plant - the largest generation station in the territory. In discussions with those attending the workshop, Derek and Chad learned about some of the (perceived and actual) barriers to moving toward renewable energy in small hamlets across the territory.

Apart from the official workshop activities, Derek and Chad also engaged in impromptu conversations with workshop attendees and others they met in Iqaluit during the week. Some of these conversations may evolve into working and/or research relationships, especially if the aforementioned NRCan funding opportunities are taken up by hamlets and/or researchers with A SHARED Future.
